Translations

The different senses of the headword itself are translated, with information to help you find which sense you need. In addition, many examples of a sense in use are provided and translated, especially when the main translation does not work in all contexts, or when unexpected verbs or prepositions may be needed.

Whenever a translation is a headword on the other side of the dictionary it is blue and hyperlinked. You can use it to go to that entry in the other side of the dictionary.

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Pronunciations

Pronunciation is given for headwords using audio and IPA (symbols that show the sound that each letter represents in the word in question) for English headwords, and audio for Portuguese headwords. Click on the IPA for an explanation of the symbols. Click on the speaker buttons to hear the word spoken aloud.

You can also click on the speaker button next to any Portuguese word or phrase on either side of the dictionary to hear it spoken aloud.

Phrases, phrasal verbs, and derivative entries

Phrases, phrasal verbs, and derivative entries are given at the end of relevant entries, and in English-Portuguese also as standalone entries which link back to the parent.


